And, yes, they had made an appointment, we would meet him in due course.





Sunday 22nd - The First Farewell

With residents from both house and bungalows plus trustees, staff, visitors, relatives and many friends, the room whose previous maximum was thought to be 60 or 70 was full to more than maximum capacity with about 140 people there to give thanks and pay tribute to Stewart's work over his years here as General Manager. He came from an engineering background and only with God's wis-



dom could the trustees of the time have chosen to appoint him to run a Care Home! But God knew the gifts, the abilities and the potential He had put within him.

Our Pastor, Ian Masson led a service in which several friends were invited to give gifts and words of appreci-

ation to Stewart, who replied briefly emphasising the virtues of the family ethos of friendship that exists amongst all who live & work at EG. His response to a query about the best achievement of his time was to point to Pastors Ian & Nigel, who have so enhanced the life here.

Ian then preached on "finishing well" as we run the race that is the Christian life. A joyful service concluded with the singing to God of "Great is Thy Faithfulness".

Tea and cakes were then served to everybody.
